

Randy Ham, flying a Maroon, Balsa-wood rocket, took first place in the Cub Scouts class. Chuck Cloud won first place for Webelos with a Sky-blue missile.

Propulsion and guidance systems were of an unsophisticated rubber-band design that powered the 10-inch, homemake rockets along a horizontal track of some 100 feet of Nylon line.

Distance, rather than speed, was the goal. But, in some cases, neither was attained when doomed missiles remained at the launch site. Astronauts, keyed up to high states of excitement, bore their disappointment well, with only a few tears and scorned rockets in evidence.

The Space Derby was part of an annual, world-wide, Cub Scout Activity. Cubs achieve their whittling requirement toward either a Wolf or Bear badge when they carve the rockets from rough forms provided by the Headquarters of Cub Scouts of America.




What proof is there, though, that God is any better than we, or that he even exists at all?







Have you ever tootled down a mountain in a Volkswagen Kombi? You might try it in one of the two buses now operating on scheduled trips to Massawa or Cheren Special Services has arranged journeys to meet the needs of most Kagnew personnel.

To begin with, trips are averaging one a week to Cheren and two a week to Massawa. The buses hold seven passengers and a driver, and are equally suited to family travel or the lone GI who want to «Get off the hill» occasionally.

Weekend trips start on Friday, returning on Sunday and there

are mid-week jaunts for trick workers on breaks.

All that is necessary is a visit to Special Services to make reservations and pay your two dollars. No phone calls will be honored.

While in either Cheren or Massawa, the buses are available as taxis. Service is 15c, any where within the city limits, including North Beach. According to our information, the buses got a work-out in Massawa on the first trip; more than 30 taxi rides were logged in a day and a half.

Drivers of the buses are experienced Ethiopian employees of Kagnew Station, well-versed in the art of driving down and back up the Cheren and Massawa escarpments.

If you are planning a picnic on the way, however... forget it. The only stops made will be for emergencies. Sudden hunger or thirst does not constitue an

emergency according to SFC Charles Shatzer, Special Services NCOIC. But, as the father of some ex-toddlers, the good Sergeant allows that car-travel with children can give rise to odd situations that might justify a stop.

When asked if he thought this might be a deterent to families thinking about the trip, we received a rather emphatic no. «This program is for everybody, including dependents, and we intend to make it as comfortable as possible».

Shatzer added that it was his opinion that a trip away from home and work is beneficial to everyone. The fellow who is over here alone, or the man with a family and his family, need to learn about their surroundings; to experience something besides the everyday routine.

At present the buses will go to Cheren and Massawa. There

are organized tours to Axum and other points of interest popping up with regularity through the Service Club via GI bus. Ethiopia has much to offer in its collection of cities of history, both past and recent.

Cheren, for instance, was the site of quite a battle early in World War II. A visit to the old fort right in the city will spark your imagination as well as your sense of beauty when you look down at Cheren from its heights.

Massawa has been a flourishing port since Biblical days and probably before that. Across the

Red Sea, if you can see far enough in your imagination, is Arabia.

For two dollars you can buy a round-trip ticket to either Cheren or Massawa. In either of these cities, you can buy a oneway ticket back to Asmara, if there is room on the Volkswagen.
