

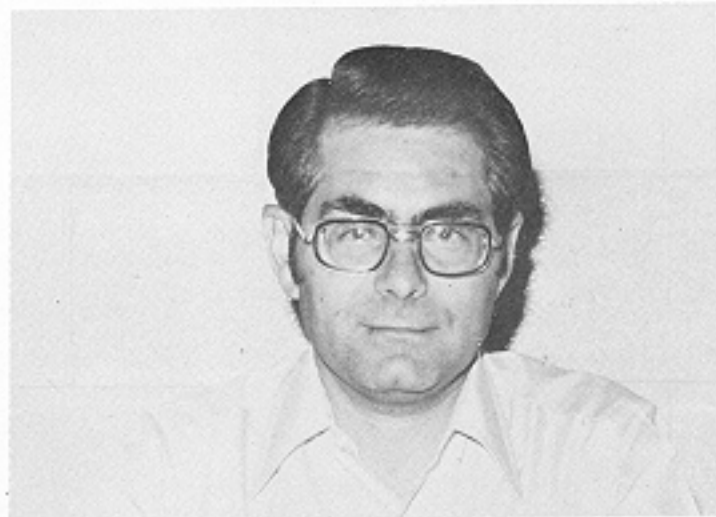
# Administration

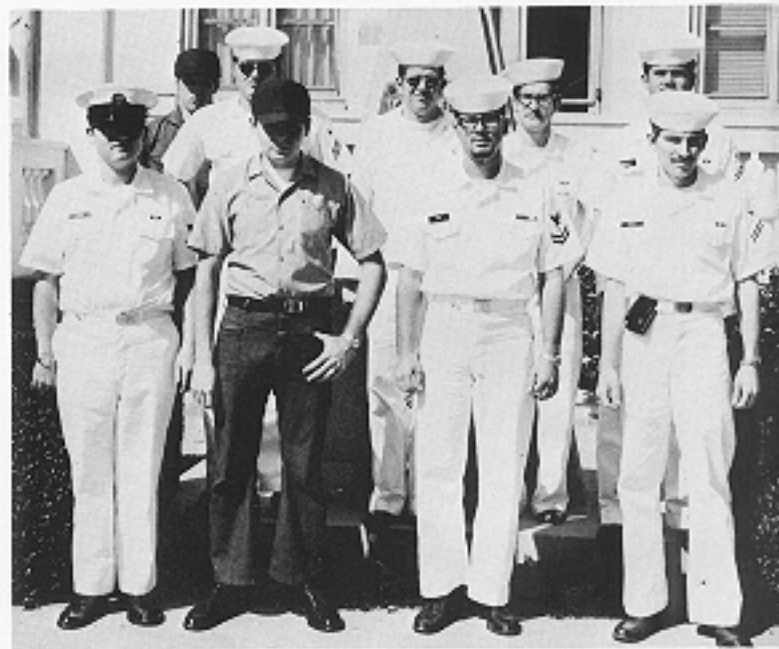

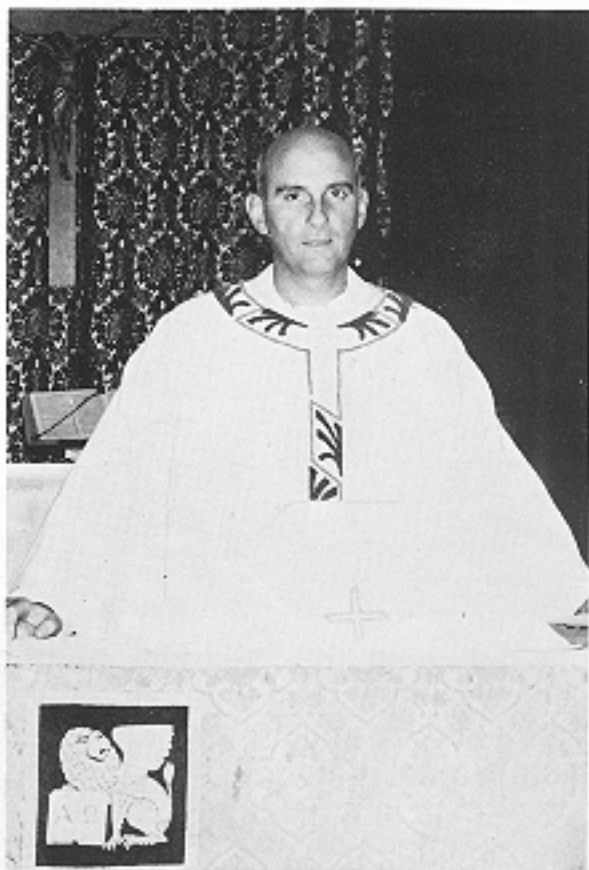

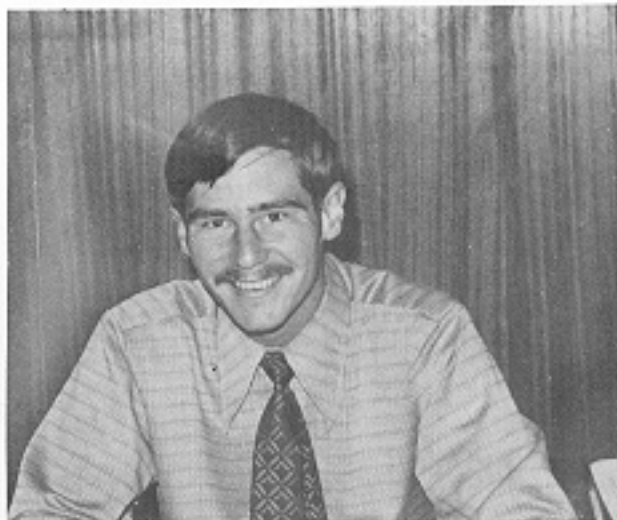
