KHRUSHCHEV ARRIVES IN THE UNITED STATES

WASHINGTON...Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev arrived in America yesterday to a cool but correct welcome from an estimated 200,000 persons. He immediately plunged into cold war talks with President Eisenhower and then took a helicopter ride over the U. S. Capital.

Khrushchev, who arrived exuding "peace and friendship," was afforded polite applause—but no cheers—as he drove 14 miles along crowded streets from the airport to downtown Washington. He encountered a flurry of boos the first time he appeared without the President.

Within three hours after the Russian leader's plane landed at Andrews Air Force Base, Maryland, Khrushchev and the President conferred at the White House in cold war talks that could alter the course of the cold war for better or worse.

The Soviet Premier, all but boasting of Russia's scientific progress, opened the meeting by presenting the President with a replica of a baseball-sized sphere that only two days ago placed the Russian hammer and sickle on the moon.

During ceremonies at the airport, he referred to the Soviet emblem as an established resident of the moon and invited American rocket scientists to place the Stars and Stripes alongside it.

After their White House talk, the President and Khrushchev took a hastily-arranged ride over Washington. The trip was not on the Premier's schedule but Eisenhower said he wanted to show him the host of middle class homes that surround the Capital.

Khrushchev's opening day schedule was capped by a "white tie" dinner given by the President.

WASHINGTON...President Eisenhower and Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev agreed to hold a "friendly and frank" discussion of all outstanding problems between their two countries in an effort to "seek ways to achieve a better understanding."

The two leaders said in a joint statement that they would pursue their discussions begun yesterday, at a series of informal talks at Camp David, Maryland, Sept. 25, 26 and 27 after Khrushchev returns to Washington from a swing around the United States.

NEW YORK...The Russians opened the iron curtain to the Voice of America yesterday but kept it tightly closed to another free world radio outlet.

The Voice, beaming factual accounts into the Soviet Union of the arrival of the Russian Premier in the United States, was given a respite from jamming for the first time in ten years. (Con't on page 2)

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Moreover, Radio Liberty, which mixed commentary, some critical, into its newscasts on Khrushchev, was jammed by Soviet transmitters as much as ever before, perhaps more. The Russians have jammed Radio Liberty broadcasts since five minutes after it went on the air in 1953.

Both the Voice of America, an official agency of the U. S. Government, and Radio Liberty, which is supported by the American Committee for Liberation, have transmitters in Europe.

For the Voice of America, it was the first time since 1949 that Russian listeners were able to tune in without artificial interference.

The Voice plans to give its Russian listeners detailed reports on Khrushchev's visit, including the complete texts of his speeches before the National Press Club and the United Nation General Assembly.

HOUSTON, TEXAS...A demented tile setter an ex-convict threw a powerful suitcase bomb into a crowd of children playing at Edgar A. Poe (White) Elementary School yesterday.

Police Captain Weldon Waycott said the bomb killed six persons, including the man who made it and his seven-year-old son, Paul.

It also killed two other pupils and a teacher and a custodian, who were trying to drive the tile setter, Paul H. Orgeron, off.

Waycott said 19 persons were injured. They were all pupils except Mrs. R. E. Doty, the Principal, who lost a leg.

Orgeron was identified by fingerprints taken from the man's hand, from papers in his wallet and from a note found in the schoolyard that was signed by P. H. Orgeron.

The note said:

"I want Bobby Orgeron, mother of my son, Dusty Paul Orgeron. I want to return my son to her. I have tried hard

to get the police department to return my son to her.

"I do not believe I can get killed without others getting killed around me, and I mean my son will get killed too."

The pupils who were killed were Bill Hawes, and Johnny Fitch, both 7. The custodian was James Montgomery and the teacher was Mrs. Kolter who taught the second grade and had just taken the children out to play.

As the group approached, Orgeron yelled, "Stay away from here or I'll blow you to pieces!"

Someone went to get Montgomery, who arrived and rushed the man. The man threw the bomb, which exploded almost instantly. It shattered windows in the school and in residences for two or three blocks around.

TOKYO...The Royal Palace announced officially that Crown Princess Michiko is pregnant.

The announcement said that medical examinations showed the 24 year old wife of Crown Prince Akihito was in her fourth month of pregnancy.

Michiko, the commoner daughter of a Japanese businessman, was married to Akihito, 25, last April. Akihito is the son of Emperor Hirohito.

LOS ANGELES...Crooner Bing Crosby became the father of a daughter for the first time Monday night when his actress-wife Kathy Grant gave birth to a girl.

The six pound, 15 ounce girl was born at Queen of Angels Hospital at 7:34 pm.

Mother and daughter were reported in "excellent condition."

Crosby's brother, Larry, the spokesman for the family, said the girl would be named Mary Frances.

Crosby has four sons by his marriage to Dixie Lee Crosby and a 1 year old son, "Tex," by his marriage to Miss Grant.

A hospital spokesman said even though the fame singer had five other children, he paced nervously through the waiting room at the hospital.

NEWS IN BRIEF

WASHINGTON...The Senate brushed aside the last major obstacles to an adjournment by approving a two-year extension of President Eisenhower's Civil Rights Commission and the multi-billion dollar foreign aid money bill.

TOKYO...Japan lodged a strong protest with the Republic of Korea over the seizure of a Japanese fishing boat earlier in the day, Monday, in the Korea Strait.

Deputy Foreign Minister Shima charged that the ROK Government broke its pledge that no Japanese fishing boats would be seized while the current negotiations were in progress.

UNITED NATIONS...Dr. Labertus N. Palar yesterday became the first Indonesian to hold a major committee chairmanship in the United Nations.

The Indonesian Ambassador to Canada was elected Chairman of the General Assembly's Trusteeship Committee by acclamation.

He was nominated by Ambassador Boland of Ireland, last year's Committee chairman, and seconded by Ambassador Thant of Burma during the opening plenary session of the 1959 Assembly. There were no other nominations.

WASHINGTON...Defense Secretary Neil H. McElroy and Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Thomas D. White will leave Sept 20 for a one-month tour of the Pacific, Far East, Australia and New Zealand.

No specific reason was given for the trip. It was noted that the survey comes during the preparation of the new Defense budget for submission to Congress next January.

HUNTSVILLE, ALABAMA...Dr. Wernher Von Braun, German-born space pioneer, said Russia is far ahead of the United

States in space projects "and there is no amount of money which can buy back lost time."

"I am convinced that if Russia stops immediately we could catch them in one, two or three years. We have the brains, the resources, the capability, but we are hampered by continuous evaluations, justifications, rejustifications, instead of progressing in our development in space projects," he said.

Von Braun said the United States needs to spend twice as much money as it now is spending on space projects. He blamed red tape, lack of funds, and complacency for the U. S. lag.

HOUSTON, TEXAS...Two year old Alan McKenzie of Australia underwent a delicate two and one half hours heart operation to correct a defect which probably would otherwise have killed him in a matter of weeks.

The blue-eyed, blond-headed youngster is about the eighth or ninth person to undergo this type of operation to correct an anomalous venous drainage. This means blood from the lungs enters the heart from the right side instead of the left.

The little patient also received a curare drug, the new anesthetic which originally was used by South American indians as poison on tips of arrows. This drug has the dramatic ability to paralyze the heart while surgery is being performed.

SAN FRANCISCO...Screen and television star Wayne Morris died of a heart attack Monday while watching air operations from the bridge of the carrier USS Bon Homme Richard.

Morris, a World War II ace and Naval reservist, was visiting his uncle and wartime squadron leader, Capt. David McCampbel, skipper of the carrier.

Morris flew 57 combat missions and downed seven Japanese planes. He was aboard the carrier as a private visitor.
